Please note that approved donations are for one year only, and are to support local community projects/initiatives up to \$10,000. Donations usually range from \$500 to an average of \$4,000-\$5,000.

Once you have registered as a user, the application is a two stage approach – the first step is completion of an eligibility check list, and if successful at this stage, you will be directed to the full application form which will be reviewed and approved by our Trustees.

The closing date for applications is Friday 4th December. Applicants will be notified by Wednesday 16th December 2020 on the decisions of their requests.
